

The primary purpose of this project is to establish profitable and scalable agriculture enterprises in resource poor urban and rural communities. Our method of implementing this project will be hands-on training and business planning, on-the ground demonstration linked to Arkansas Delta Seeds of Change Value Added Initiative that demonstrates production, processing, storage, marketing and the distribution of healthy, high quality, safe and affordable food. The key objectives in "Building School to Work Experiences project are to: (1) Improve livelihood security by creating jobs in high tunnel food production and food hub operations, (2) Increase options for HS youth to learn and work in the local food industry, and (3) Increase food security and food access with year around supplies of fresh local vegetables. (4) Link workforce with industry at the high school level.

#### PROJECT NARRATIVE

Entrepreneurial Agriculture Business Enterprise Development: Building School to Work Experiences and Workforce Training

#### **Project Description**

This project will address education, business development, entrepreneurship emphasis and job training in agriculture food systems in the Arkansas Delta. It will advance the productivity and economic competitiveness of the Delta workforce by addressing workforce development, collaborative partnerships, business development, and economic development infrastructure. It will facilitate income growth, job creation, and new employment opportunities. The project advances the State of Arkansas Consolidated Plan's strategic goals for economic development by:

- A) Working to advance the incomes of Arkansas' poorest region at a growth pace greater than the national average;
- B) Expanding entrepreneurship focusing on knowledge-based enterprises; and
- C) Taking advantage of the extraordinary agricultural assets of the Delta region of Arkansas.

This project is designed to implement a plan to create a sustainable agriculture food system in the Arkansas Delta and address and reduce "Food Desserts" in the Arkansas Delta. The plan was created and will be a part of the Arkansas Delta Seeds of Change (ADSOC). ADSOC is a coalition of representatives based in the delta region of Arkansas made up of agencies in the United State government with the Department of Agriculture being the primary one, and the Arkansas Department of Agriculture, Arkansas State government, post-secondary education institutions, financial lending institutions, public, and private community based organizations. One of the impacts that ADSOC was created to achieve is to increase the financial livelihood of people in the Arkansas Delta via the creation of agriculture related businesses enterprises.

Demand is high across the United States for locally and regionally grown food products and opportunities are increasing for farmers to meet this demand as local food systems are developed. Local growers face a myriad of challenges and barriers in accessing burgeoning local fresh fruit and vegetable markets. This project will identify and assist entrepreneurs to establish the necessary business enterprises that are needed to create financially productive food systems in the Delta. This project will provide new jobs and expand existing jobs in agriculture related business entities. This project will have a positive impact on the economic livelihood of communities, farmers and other individuals in the Arkansas Delta.

The long term goal of the project is to increase the commercial competitiveness of socially disadvantaged farmers in the vegetable industry. Using high tunnels allows for early and extended season growing and year around growing. The project will provide youth (male and female) with occupational experiences and learning in all components of the vegetable value chain including producing, harvesting, post-harvesting handling and storage, food safety, marketing, business planning and recordkeeping. The high tunnels and pack house ensure that high school students will gain real life experiencing in bringing high quality vegetables into the commercial market place in communities experiencing food desserts in Woodruff County and other communities throughout Eastern Arkansas. Overall, investing in high school youth will raise the "competitive bar" among poor farming communities. They are the future farmers of America and need to be equipped with new skills, knowledge and attitudes to create awareness and interest about the opportunities to engage in profitable farming today.



The related short-term or phase 1 objectives are: (1) Improve livelihood security by creating jobs in high tunnel food production and pack house operations, (2) Increase options for HS youth to learn and work in the local food industry, and (3) Increase food security and food access with year around supplies of fresh local vegetables in communities with food desserts.

The target population in this project is high school youth. Youth may be interested in owning and operating a business, but they lack the capital, financial management or viable technical skills to succeed. We are specifically targeting high school students in the Augusta High School Vocational Agriculture Program to build their practical and vocational skills in the local fresh produce industry, and facilitate a school to work career pathway.

Not enough young people have had exposure to entrepreneurship in agriculture, to evaluate farming as a potential career option. Although the Youth Entrepreneur Program championed by the Arkansas Land and Farm Development Corporation of Fargo, AR has contributed to increasing the number of African-Americans majoring in agriculture fields at college, African-America youth have not embraced farming as a career. If more experience is provided to learn the practical skills of operating farm enterprises in high school, African-American beginning farmers below the age of 30 will result.



Our goal is to partner with the Augusta, High School Vocational Agriculture Program (AHSVAP) to plan and implement a relevant school to work supervised occupation learning approach with students. The project team will: 1) operate the high tunnel in Cotton Plant and the greenhouse on the Augusta High School campus to facilitate early planting and seasonal extension of crops, and 2) Provide students at the AHSVAP with structured learning experiences that include practicums that will require them to demonstrate decision-making, hands-on skill

acquisitions, developing a group business plan and the provision of inputs and mentoring to implement the business plan. Demonstrating the skills of operating a pack house will also be a critical component, and provide students with an opportunity to earn income

We plan to provide students with a comprehensive supervised occupational experiences: 1) managing high tunnels, 2) producing vegetables in the high tunnels and on raised beds plastic mulch drip irrigation system, 3) writing and implementing business plans for student vegetable enterprises and 4) providing mentor support through the process of packing, storing, marketing and selling in various buyer clusters including farmer markets in cotton plant and Augusta, local restaurants, their own school, and other institutions.

This project will address business development, entrepreneurship emphasis and job training in agriculture food system in the Arkansas Delta. It will advance the productivity and economic competitiveness of the Delta workforce by addressing workforce development, collaborative partnerships, business development, and economic development infrastructure. It will facilitate income growth, job creation, and new employment opportunities. The project advance Governor Mike Beebe's strategic goals for the economic development by: a)working to advance the income of Arkansas' poorest region at a growth pace greater than the national average; b)expanding entrepreneurship focusing on knowledge-based enterprises; and c)taking advantage of the extraordinary agricultural assets of the Delta region of Arkansas. ## BALD KNOB SCHOOL DISTRICT

#### ALE CONSORTIA

The Bald Knob School District (Known as Lead District) will provide Alternative Learning Environment services for select students from Public School Districts (Known as Participating Districts) that are partnering with the Lead District for the 2014-2015 school year. The ALE will be known as the Bald Knob ALE Consortia. The ALE Consortia will serve students K-12 that have been screened and meet the criteria for eligibility as defined in the ALE Consortia Handbook prior to placement in the Alternative Learning Environment. The Lead District will employ three certified teachers and other staff as listed:

- 1. K-4
- Middle Level certified in four content areas
- 3. High School Content Areas
- 4. ALE Director for .5 FTE
- 5. There will be two additional paraprofessionals for ALE (one paraprofessional provided by Bald Knob School District and one paraprofessional/ counselor provided by Families Inc).

### Participating Districts Agree:

- 1. Purchase "Reserved Seats" that are priced as listed:
- Reserved student seats (7- 12 grade students) will cost the Minimum Foundation Funding Per Student and the Alternative Learning Funding per student. Participating Districts will reserve a minimum of two 7 12 grade student /seats (MFPA/ALE funding). The additional seats purchased beyond the first two seats will be \$5,000 per student for students in grades Kindergarten through eighth grade. Any additional student/seats needed by the participating districts throughout the year that are not reserved will be based upon availability and pro-rated on the \$5,000 per student/ seat amount on a quarterly basis.
- 2. The Participating Districts will make four equal quarterly payments on September,1, December 1, March 1, and June 1 to pay for the reserved seats to participate in the ALE Consortia.
- 3. The Participating Districts will ensure that the ALE Consortia Director is provided the necessary support (i.e. phone conferences regarding student behavior, attendance

issues, etc.) and information (i.e. behavior plans, IEP, evaluation data, etc.) to be compliant when serving Special Education students.

- 4. The Participating Districts' administrator or designee will attend quarterly meetings at a time that is mutually agreeable for all Participating District with the Director of the ALE Consortia.
- 5. The transportation of the ALE Consortia students is the responsibility of the Participating Districts.
- 6. The ALE Consortia handbook will be created by the Lead District and the Participating Districts will approve the Handbook by June 15, 2014.
